



## Potter's Bowl returns for 14th year

#### **Fundraiser:**

Annual event benefits **Community Caregivers** of Greater Derry.

DERRY — An annual fundraiser event called the Potraiser event called the Pot-ter's Bowl, where attendees get a pottery bowl donated by local craftsmen and students and enjoy a wide array of soups and breads, is returning to Pinkerton Academy on Feb. 2, the day before the Super Bowl. The event, now in its 14th

The event, now in its 14th year, is one of the biggest fundraisers for Community Caregivers of Greater Derry according to Executive Di-rector Cindee Tanuma. "It's a huge endeavor,"

"It's a huge endeavor," Tanuma said. "It's the cul-mination of a lot of people doing a little."

She said they will have about 200 pottery bowls from professional artists, and another 200 bowls doand another 200 bowls do-nated from students and amateurs. Some bowls were donated by Pinkerton Academy, Goffstown High School, Londonderry High School, Studio 550 in Man-chester and You're Fired in Bedford

Bedford. In addition to those bowls, they'll also have about 60 to 75 crafted items and other works of art up for auction. The total value of the donated art exceeds \$5.000. Tanuma said.

Tanuma said she hopes to raise between \$10,000 and

\$11,000 after expenses. Attendees will be able to Attendees will be able to sample about a dozen dif-ferent soups from local res-taurants. Tickets are \$40, a price that hasn't changed for five years, Tanuma said. This year, the event is start-ing a \$10 ticket for kids under 12. Tanuma said the profes-sional bowls themselves are

valued at about \$30.

valued at about \$30. Participating restau-rants include Sabatino's North Italian Restaurant and Halligan Tavern in Derry, and Jainie's Un-common Cafe and The

common Cafe and The Coach Stop Restaurant in Londonderry. There will be corn chow-der, fish chowder, Italian wedding soup and more. The culinary students at Pinkerton Academy's Astro Cafe will be making a hutunder 12. Tanuma said the profes-sional bowls themselves are

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
